What one does find, on searching the literature, however, is that methan qualone is a drug whose characteristics are not well established (whether or not it is physically addictive is a holly contended question) and one which has tremendous potential for abuse.

When used in conjunction with even modest quantities of alcohol, a not unlikely circumstance, these effects are multiplied many times. The combination of alcohol and methaqualone has reportedly resulted in several deaths already and will undoubtedly account for many more.
